



1.0 Message from the Chair

The last year of the pandemic has continued to present unprecedented challenges for family support centres and those they assist across Canada. Adopting a priority-driven, building-block approach, Families Canada (FC) surveyed members and stakeholders, devised strong business plans, expanded our social enterprise and scaled up our digital presence, all sharply focused on continued corporate infrastructure modernization and sustainability.

Pandemic-inspired operational reconfiguration forever changed the way FC members support families. Given inequalities in capacities to cope and thrive, community organizations heroically responded to their families' needs, but they needed FC's help. Making better use of FC's web 'real estate' to deliver online programs, resources, and content became mission critical. FC ended 2020 having offered some 40 free online events with some sessions enjoying sign-ups of 1200-1400 family support practitioners.

FC also opted for intense focus on e-commerce through the build of a new store with support from Digital Main Street which should be open for business in early fall 2021. It will offer resources in print/digital formats and facilitate access to multi-media products such as e-learning modules, podcasts, videos, and paid events including professional development plus online training for frontline service providers.

Members and stakeholders have responded positively to the business model shift, encouraging FC to do more and directing focus to the areas of highest interest. Thanks to our digital transformation, FC has emerged from the pandemic well-positioned to take on new challenges.

4.0 Our COVID-19 Support to Members and Families

4.1 Financial Literacy

Increasing Financial Literacy Opportunities for Women Living on Low Incomes: An Action Plan for Change.

April 2018 – March 2022

Funded by Women and Gender Equality Canada

Like all Canadians, women living on low incomes need basic financial literacy knowledge, skills and confidence to improve their quality of life. Through national research, this project identified gender-



specific barriers that prevent women living on low incomes from accessing financial literacy programs. It also identified recommendations for improving program delivery.

This year, FC:

- Released the ground-breaking report "Accessing Financial Literacy Education Programs: Barriers and Opportunities for Women Living on Low Incomes"
- Presented research findings at the Financial Consumer Agency of Canada's Innovation in Financial Education event
- Continued developing an Action Plan to support women's financial empowerment

Thank you to our funder and partners—the Canadian Credit Union Association and Vancity—for supporting this work.

This year, FC also secured additional funding to act on the research recommendations.

SAFE Women (Safety and Financial Empowerment for Women)

April 2021 – March 2023

Funded by Women and Gender Equality Canada

Building on our previous financial literacy work, this project will address the need for Trauma and Violence-Informed Approaches (TVIA) in financial literacy programming by developing a toolkit of TVIA resources and learning opportunities for financial literacy educators.

In the next two years, FC will broaden:

- awareness of TVIA and how it can be applied to financial literacy education
- access to practical TVIA tools and information by developing a TVIA toolkit tailored for financial literacy educators

We look forward to meeting this pressing need in conjunction with our partners, CPA Canada, the Canadian Credit Union Association, and Vancity, and moving the dial for women's financial empowerment.

4.2 Intergenerational Volunteering Integrating Senior Newcomers through Intergenerational Volunteering at Family Support Centres

April 2018 – March 2021

Funded by Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada

This year, FC successfully wrapped up a national Intergenerational Volunteering pilot program in eight family support centres across

Canada. The project demonstrated that intergenerational volunteering is

a viable intervention that can help reduce seniors' social isolation, particularly amongst newcomers.

Although COVID-19 brought in-person programming to a halt, pilot sites were able to adjust programming quickly

by moving to an outreach model where possible (phone calls, Zoom programming, kindness cards from children to seniors, etc.) to ensure ongoing connections with seniors. Community organizations were innovative, spent additional time and sought out family members or friends to help with translation where possible.

This year, FC:

 Produced culturally-adapted versions of the Intergenerational Volunteering programming guide in Arabic and Simplified Chinese (with

support from New Horizons for Seniors Program, Economic and Social Development Canada)

- Produced a report on the Intergenerational
 Volunteering pilot program. The report includes seven key lessons learned in piloting an
 Intergenerational Volunteering program
- Developed two recorded webinars on Intergenerational Volunteering, including lessons learned, which can be accessed on our YouTube channel

FC will continue to share knowledge with our members and service providers across Canada to encourage the scaling up of intergenerational programming between seniors—including newcomers—and preschool-aged children.

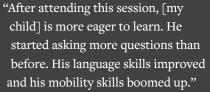

4.3 Children's Rights

FC champions children's rights in all our work. The *Nobody's Perfect* and the *Positive Discipline in Everyday Parenting* programs, which we actively support, are founded on a rights-based approach.

Last year, as part of our Parenting initiative, we helped community-based organizations in Ontario adapt their *Nobody's Perfect* parent groups for online delivery, allowing parents to better support their children's rights during the pandemic. As part of our Play initiative, we finished developing a plethora of new play resources—including new *Why Play?* pamphlets and activity cards which support children's right to play. Take a look at the resources section for more information!

In the coming year, we will be working with Carleton University on a new project funded by the Social Science and Humanities Research Council, titled: "Children's rights, climate change, and emotional wellbeing: equipping young Canadians to thrive in times of crisis". As the project's community partner, FC will help recruit research participants and mobilize research findings.

We continue to work in partnership with the Landon Pearson Centre for the Study of Childhood and Children's Rights, and many others, to actualize Canada's commitment to the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child.

4.4 Food Safety

Promoting Health and Inclusion of Senior Newcomers Through Food

March 2021 – March 2022 Funded by Employment and Social Development Canada

COVID-19 has caused an increase in food insecurity, especially for isolated populations. This project, extended due to the pandemic, aims to support the healthy aging of newcomer seniors in Ottawa by identifying and addressing challenges they face in accessing services, resources, and information on food safety and nutrition. In the coming year, FC will engage newcomer seniors in an interactive workshop to identify these challenges and develop helpful

multilingual brochures through consultations with community partners and newcomer seniors. While the project focuses on Ottawa, we hope that the results and resources will be useful to a much wider population.

4.5 Social Inclusion of Newcomers

Every year, family support centres across Canada welcome newcomers and help them build ties to their community.

A new video, "Being a Senior in Canada," is now available in seven languages on YouTube. Thank you to the Mosaic Newcomer Family Resource Network for helping create the video! The series aims to help newcomers adjust to life in Canada and encourages them to access information, programs, services, and resources in their community.

This year, we also promoted the social inclusion of newcomers through our very popular Intergenerational Volunteering program where the majority of participating seniors identified as newcomers.

4.6 Parenting

Supported Parents: Supportive Parenting

April 2018 – April 2022

Funded by Ontario Trillium Foundation

FC is supporting minority-speaking language communities in Ontario by increasing parents and caregivers' parenting skills through the *Nobody's Perfect* parenting program. This program is designed to meet the needs of parents with children aged o-5 who may be facing multiple barriers. Whether they are young, single, living on low incomes, socially or geographically isolated or have limited formal education, the *Nobody's Perfect* parenting program supports them on their journey of parenthood.

Ongoing evaluations show that *Nobody's Perfect* effectively promotes positive parenting, improves understanding of children's health, safety and behavior and helps prevent family violence. Evidence also shows effective parenting programs reduce social and mental health challenges experienced by children later in life.

Throughout this project, FC has:

- Translated the Nobody's Perfect parent kits into Arabic, Punjabi, Simplified Chinese and Spanish
- Trained 40 new bilingual program facilitators
- Partnered with 29 family support centres across
 Ontario to deliver the program to minority
 language speaking parents

Once COVID-19 hit, *Nobody's Perfect* parent groups needed to be delivered virtually. FC responded by holding an online refresher training for facilitators. Next year, expect programming to continue online with the possibility of in-person sessions to reach up to 2000 parents across Ontario.

4.7 Play

Early Childhood Development Science to Practice: Knowledge Mobilization Project

March 2018 – May 2021
Funded by Employment and Social
Development Canada

This year FC and partners produced a number of evidence-based resources on early childhood development. These resources make the latest science and information in the Encyclopedia on Early Childhood Development accessible to vulnerable families, community-level organisations, and service providers working directly with parents and children.

The resources include:

- A number of additional brochures under FC's flagship *Why Play?* series including pamphlets specific for parents of children with intellectual disabilities and First Nations parents. The *Why Play?* Spotlight series was also launched with four new pamphlets on language development, emotional expression, self-regulation, and prosocial behaviour.
- A new set of 24 Why Play? Activity Cards contain attractive illustrations and science-based examples of play activities that support essential competencies and skills in early childhood.
- The Supporting Families podcast, hosted by renowned pediatrician, Dr. Paul Roumeliotis, CEO of Eastern Ontario Health Unit and FC's new and esteemed Board Chair. The podcast engages expert speakers on various early childhood development topics.

• Two e-modules on Brain Development and Play. These were developed with support from the Science of Early Childhood Development, Red River College. These modules will be released on FC's Virtual Institute in 2021.

In response to COVID-19, FC and the Centre of Excellence for Early Childhood Development (CEECD) launched a webinar series titled Early



Childhood Development in a Time of Pandemic. This proved a great success with more than 1,000 family support practitioners across Canada participating in the 6-part series. The topics (such as self-regulation and resilience) were aimed at

helping service providers support parents of young children during unprecedented social and economic restrictions and challenges.

4.8 Trauma and Violence-Informed Approaches (TVIA) **Incorporating Trauma and Violence-Informed Approaches in Ottawa Family Support Programs**

March 2020 - March 2021 Funded by the Ottawa Community Foundation

Adequately supporting those • impacted by trauma and domestic/ family violence is crucial, especially during the COVID-19 crisis. This project created tools to help family support practitioners in Ottawa

• incorporate TVIA into their program delivery, to better meet the needs of program participants experiencing trauma and domestic/family violence.

This was achieved by:

- Hosting a focus group with family support practitioners in the Ottawa area to explore their knowledge of and training needs related to TVIA in programming
- - Providing a tailored training webinar to family support practitioners in Ottawa who provide direct programming and assistance to families
- Developing four infographics for family support practitioners

When practitioners are equipped with knowledge on how to foster safe environments, families can be better served and supported.

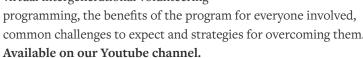

- 2. Why Play? for First Nations Parents and Caregivers. The content was adapted in partnership with the National Collaborating Centre for Indigenous Health.

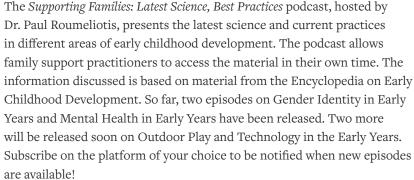


Why Play? Activity Cards

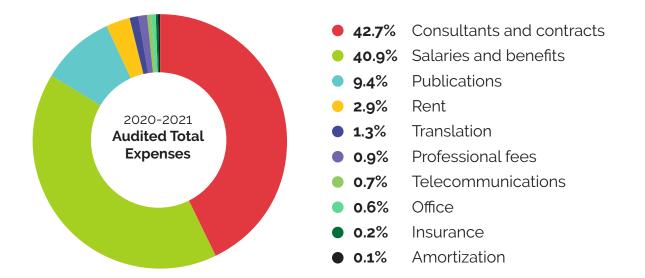

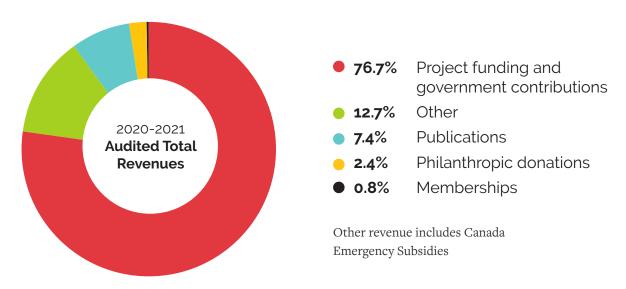

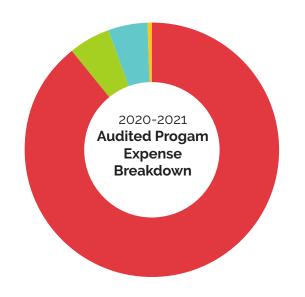
